The Twin Cities metro area is growing at a rapid clip, though not quite as fast as previously anticipated, and more than half of that growth will occur outside the urban core and devel-

In fact, 47 percent of new households and new housing coming to the region by the year 2040 are expected to be situated in developing suburbs, and another 9 percent likely will land in outlying rural areas — for a total of 3.67 million people. That's up from 2.85 million people in 2010.

Redwood Falls man pleads guilty in teen's fatal overdose

One of the men charged in the fatal 2012 overdose of a St. Paul teen on a cough syrup cocktail pleaded guilty to a drug felony Wednesday.

Robert C. Kibble, 26, of Redwood Falls, Minn., pleaded guilty to third-degree drug sale.

He also was sentenced Wednesday in Dakota County District Court to two years and three months in prison, with 66 days' credit for time already served. Kibble will begin serving the sentence immediately.

Graduation rate highest in decades, says Dept. of Education MCT DIRECT largest gains among racial

Minnesota's high school graduation rate is the highest it has been in at least a decade, with all student groups showing gains in

Data released Wednesday by the Minnesota Department of Education show 79.5 percent of high school seniors received diplomas last year, up from 77.5 percent the year before.

Black and Hispanic students posted some of the subgroups as well as students learning English and those who live in poverty.

Despite the gains, a gap remains between the number of white students earning a diploma and their minority peers.

That gap has closed in the past three years with black and Hispanic students making the most progress, improving their graduation rates more than 10 percentage points since 2010.

The Space Station founders want to be able to help people out if they need another musician for a band, for example.


The directors can help find that person for you. The studio can also be a resource for businesses looking to make a jingle. It's a hub for musicians.
