## Cool weather slows fishing license sales

BEMIDJI — The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources blames the cool spring for slow fishing license sales heading into Saturday's walleye opener.

Fishing license sales are down by about a third.

Jenifer Wical of the DNR's Fish and Wildlife Division tells Minnesota Public Radio News that around 250,000 to 300,000 fishing licenses usually are sold by this time. But she says just under 200,000 have been sold so far.

The DNR has several new license options available this year. Anglers who want to fish only for a weekend can buy a 72-hour license for \$12, which is less than half the cost of a full season license.

## Move: Would save money, allow resource sharing

said. "It will certainly be more convenient."

M State approached the Workforce Center about a year ago with an idea to move the center to the library wing of the campus.

"We put our heads together and we came up with this plan," Kennedy said. "We just thought that this was a way that we could combine the resources and positively impact whoever was in need of our services."

The workforce center and its partners found that it would be feasible to change locations, but the college would need to complete

some renovations in the library wing in order for that to happen, Sachs said.

They're looking at creating the Center for Student Workforce Success, where Fergus Falls workforce and its partners would provide the same services, "but we'd be providing them out on campus," Sachs said. "And the feeling is we'd be able to reach more people who could use our services."

At the college, the workforce center would actually have about 1,700 square feet less compared to the downtown center, according to Sachs, but they would gain flexible spaces to use, like

conference rooms, cafeteria space and a computer lab. On the other hand, the move would save them some green.

"It would definitely be a significant savings to the workforce center system," Sachs said.

The project would update and repurpose the existing library, meeting and classroom spaces that are underused and in need of equipment upgrades. The space hasn't been renovated since the early 1970s.

The renovations would cost about \$1.5 million, according to Kennedy.

"We hope that we can get

half of that from the state and that we could raise the other half," Kennedy said.

M State submitted the project for a 2014 capital budget request of \$750,000. It would be part of a bonding bill with M State. The Fergus Area College Foundation is prepared to raise money for the project as part of the capital campaign.

"It's one of our priorities," Kennedy said. "It's very highly thought of by the people that rated it."

They hope to find out this spring or summer whether they received funding for the project, and Kennedy is "highly optimistic."

know other people who've traveled to other states to marry.

They haven't decided yet if they will tie the knot, should it become legal in Minnesota.

It's something they will have to sit down and discuss, Messenger said.

"After 31 years, you're pretty much there already," Messenger said. "You just don't have the paper."

Martz wouldn't rush into anything, and it might just be

a matter of going to the justice of the peace, he said.

Unlike many other same-sex couples out there, Martz and Messenger have enjoyed support and acceptance from those around them in Fergus Falls.

Messenger said he feels lucky to have that, and it's too bad that others have a harder time. It may be a minority, but "all minorities have the right to be accepted," he said.

"That's an important issue, too, just being accept-

ed for who you are," Messenger said. "It's the person that's the important part."

For those who oppose gay marriage, Messenger said it might be that they need to examine their own lives.

A lot of people don't realize it right away, but they

might have a family member who is gay, Messenger said.

"And you just don't decide to be gay or straight, it just happens," Martz said. "We pay as many taxes as everybody else and therefore, we should be treated equally."
