Also, the Prairie Island Indian Community has donated \$10,000 to Disabled Hockey in Minnesota for the second straight year.

She is fourth on the team in rebounds, averaging 2.9 per game, and she ranks third in offensive rebounds with 21.

Daleiden, a graduate of Plum City, scored five points and grabbed one

rebound in a 73-68 win Wednesday over UW-Superior. UW-Stout holds a 7-10 overall record and is 2-6 in the Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

• Men's basketball player **Caleb Rosenow** continues to lead the way in the rebounds category for the Carleton Knights.

In a home 86-55 win over Macalester on Monday, the junior from Red Wing matched his career high with nine boards to lead the team. Rosenow tied with teammate Carter Biewen to lead the team with four rebounds in a 56-51 loss at Gustavus on Jan. 15.

Through 14 games, Rosenow leads the team with 73 total rebounds (27 offensive; he averages 5.2 per game. He has led the Knights in rebounds in seven games this season. He's also second in points with 140.

"They played tremendous defense," Cannon Falls coach Chuck Benda said. "They didn't give us many good looks."

Makenzie Franklin led the Bombers with eight points while teammate Courtney Woodcock tallied six assists.

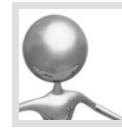

Her first tumbling pass was a round-off, back handspring, double full; her second pass was a front handspring, front full; and her third tumbling pass was a round-off back

handspring, 1 1/2 twist.

Mason tied for first place on the uneven bars with a 9.275 and she placed fourth on the balance beam with an 8.375. Her all-around score of 35.6 was good enough for third place.

Teammate Meaghan Howell won the all-around competition with a 36.4, while Northfield's Abby Stets was second with a 36.275.

"Our team expects to get back to where we were last year," Mason said. "My goal is to make it to state in all-around and to do my best at state."
