Locked-out Crystal workers to vote on contract

HILLSBORO — Workers who have been locked out at their jobs at American Crystal Sugar for more than a year will hold a fifth vote on the company's last contract offer this month.

Gayln Olson is the president of workers' union in Hillsboro. Olson tells The Grand Forks Herald the workers will vote on the contract on April 13.

The union last voted on the contract in December. At that point, 55 percent of the union workers voted to

reject the contract.

About 1,300 American Crystal Sugar workers have been locked out since August 2011 after they rejected the company's contract.

After break, Minn. lawmakers face long to-do list

ST. PAUL — For Minnesota lawmakers, spring break is over and the required end of the 2013 legislative session is not far around the corner.

The Legislature returns Tuesday with about seven

weeks to finish writing a new two-year budget, decide whether to legalize gay marriage and make any revisions to state gun laws.

House Speaker Paul Thissen says lawmakers should expect the pace to pick up considerably. Much of April will be spent voting on pieces of the budget.

Leaders say the bill to allow same-sex marriage won't come up until budget bills are voted off the House and Senate floors.

Also unresolved are measures to boost the minimum wage and to provide

a subsidy toward a planned Mayo Clinic expansion in Rochester.

Counselors help students deal with siblings' death

ZIMMERMAN — Counselors will be available at an elementary school in eastern Minnesota where students will deal with the loss of two classmates.

Students at Zimmerman Elementary School return from spring break Tuesday. They will likely look for answers as to why 7-year-

old Stephanie Shields and her 6-year-old brother, Nolan, were found dead on Easter Sunday.

The bodies of the children and their mother, 35-year-old Stephanie Shields, were found in their home by a family member. Authorities say

no suspects are being sought in the deaths, but declined to explain. They also won't say how the three died.

Principal Susan Johnston tells KMSPTV that school officials were notified Monday of the siblings' deaths.

and a group of citizens started it as a project," Krefit said.

The class has also worked on the Elbow Lake Courthouse and does something in the town's library each year. The current class project will be to build a picnic shelter at Fairhaven beach and the group is coordinating the effort with the Elbow Lake Lions club.

With each project the class does, Krefit said students have something around town that they can take pride in.

"These are things that can stick with them, that they can cherish later and think back to the part they had in getting it done," Krefit said.


While the class usual attracts those interested in careers like carpentry and

with me on these details," Sievert said, of VanAntwerpen.

The project's proposal has 35 photographers shooting at the RTC from 12 p.m. to 3 p.m. May 4. The staff response to the proposal did not agree with some of the proposal's points, creating the lengthy discussion Monday.

Council member Jay Cichosz said clarification was part of the issue.

"I think we've gotten some different information at times," Cichosz said. For example, the idea that there were multiple photo sessions instead of just one. May 3 and May 5 would be days for standard tours of the RTC by the Friends of the Kirkbride.

"I personally don't have a problem with getting this photographed," Cichosz said. "What can we do to get this done?"

Council member Ben Schierer agreed that there's value to the project. The council approved a security control outline for the RTC March 18. It was something they didn't want to prevent beneficial projects, he said.

"I'm afraid that's what's happening here," Schierer said.

Initially, the city recommendation for the project included a \$5,000 deposit to

cover for estimated staff time and electricity.

"I think Christian would say that would be a deal breaker," said the Rev. Jon Olson, project liaison who spoke on behalf of the project Monday.

Sievert said they could possibly come up with six security people, which was more than the estimates as part of the city recommendation.

Council member Scott Rachels said he knows it's a good project, but he wanted VanAntwerpen to come and present the details to the council. He also was concerned about straying too much from the plan of charging as part of the security guidelines.

"He picked a date without even asking us," Rachels said. "We have to stick to our plan."

Olson said there was "verbal encouragement that it would likely happen" back in January, and that part of this feels like the rules changed during the game, while the guidelines were being worked out.

The purpose of the project is to preserve the memory of the Kirkbride's service as a state hospital before it's either re-purposed or demolished. The photos would be placed on a website where they would be interactively viewable to the public.
