file a new permit every time they wanted to move a fence.

With the response from the public, the board wants the provision to get a second look.

The third major revision proposal came within the sanitation code, requiring point-of-sale certification of compliance when transferring property.

Because funds are usually available to check sanitation compliance during the time of property transfer, the county will require sellers to furnish buyers with certification at or

before closing dates for sale.

Certificates would last three years for systems already installed. New systems would last five.

According to Kalar, most lending institutions already require the compliance checks, and the changes are meant to extend the requirements to those who do not go through traditional lending sources.

The board did not act on the proposed amendments

and they will go back to the Public Works Committee for review and possible revision on May 7. The changes will be back in front of the board May 21.

that go," said Wayne Runnigen, former Pelican Rapids mayor. "Because they're a big part of the community."

Fox was a lifelong resident of Pelican Rapids. He started work with the Pelican Rapids Police Department in 1978 where his career included the roles of patrol officer, DARE officer, school liaison and chief of police in November 2001. He retired in 2008 after 30 years in law enforcement.

Runnigen knew Fox for most of his life, and he was the one who hired Fox as the police chief. Fox was one who worked with a lot of younger officers who used Pelican Rapids PD as a stepping stone.

"He was always involved in helping train the young guys and was really hands on with them," Runnigen said. "A lot of

guys had an association with him through the department here."

When Fox retired and current Pelican Rapids Police Chief Jeff Stadium took over, Fox did everything he could to make it a smooth transition for him.

"He took his job seriously," Stadium said. "He wanted me to have everything that he had."

More recently, Fox was working as a part-time deputy for the Otter Tail County Sheriff's Office in courthouse security. Sheriff Brian Schlueter had known Fox for 18 years. He said Fox was a man that truly cared about people and his community.

"I think he's just a quality person," Schlueter said. "Always very professional, but then always lighthearted. He was a fun guy to be around."

Volunteer was another hat that Fox wore.

"He was always willing

to do a lot of things for the community," Runnigen said.

Fox was active in the Boy Scouts, Faith Lutheran Church, the Crisis Response Team, a board member of Someplace Safe, president of the library board, and Masons.

"That will be missed a lot," Runnigen said. Retired Otter Tail County Lt. Mike Boen worked with Fox for most of their careers. They even teamed up to rescue a dog named Foster from the Pelican River in December 2001. The dog was trapped on the ice, so Fox went to his home a couple blocks away and got a duck boat which they used for the rescue.

"It was an interesting day," Boen said.

Not only was Fox a fine officer, but he was also a good husband to his wife Gail, and proud of his children, Ryan and Kristin,

Boen said. It was the character and integrity of Fox that also made him stand out, according to Boen.

"He would do what was right," Boen said. "When maybe doing what the right thing was wasn't the most popular thing to do."

Boen and Fox were classmates and had known each other their whole lives. As time went on, Boen considered him a friend. A daily cup of coffee became the norm for them. Boen would stop in town before heading to work, just for a cup and some current events. Often times he'd stop again on his way home.

Boen remembered many life events they went through together: weddings, children, confirmations and graduations.

"We spent a lot of time together over the years," Boen said. "With the number of years that you share in this profession and

meeting on a day-to-day basis, it's a brotherhood. We've shared a lot of life together.

"And he'll be sorely missed."

Red River close to cresting

FARGO — The Red River appeared close to reaching its peak in Fargo and Moorhead Tuesday after the National Weather Service dropped its crest forecast for the third straight day.

The weather service adjusted the anticipated peak of the river to 33.3 feet, down from the 35.5-foot estimate that came out Monday and the 37-foot projection that was issued on Sunday. The river begins flooding at 18 feet but few structures are affected until 38 feet.

The river was at 33.16 feet at 6 p.m. Tuesday.

able to help make the lives of those undergoing cancer treatment a little less stressful with this program, we've accomplished what we've set out to do," Larry Schulz, CEO of LRH, said.

The vehicle is available to patients with an identified need for the assistance. The Cancer Center's patient navigator, social workers and medical staff will refer patients to the program, and volunteers will be scheduled accordingly to ensure transportation isn't a barrier to receiving the treatments needed. The service will be provided for patients up to a 60-mile radius from Fergus Falls.

"Using the transportation program was the only way I could get to my appointment," said Cynthia, a Cancer Center patient who has received transportation services. The program began in

February and has provided more than 500 miles and more than 20 rides to patients in the Fergus Falls, Ashby, Elbow Lake and surrounding communities, even as far away as Kent, Minn.
